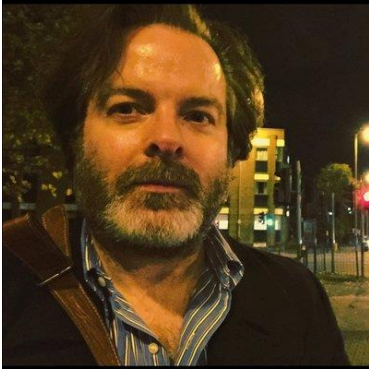

The speakers will be Alle Bloom from the UK Data Service, who will give an introduction to the datasets available, Smruti Bulsari from the University of Essex, who will present on the English indices of multiple deprivation in her research on dementia prevalence, and Emily Ennis from the University of Leeds, who will present on the Priority Places for Food Index that uses open data to determine levels of food insecurity across the UK.

Each speaker will provide a 20-minute presentation. The talks will be followed by a quick-fire question and answer slot.

The DRTN is a collaboration between a number of ESRC-funded resource centres that are working together to promote the value and use of social science data. She completed her PhD. in the area of "Rape Laws" in 2013. Prior to joining NLUO, she worked at KIIT Law School for 13 years. Prior to academia she was a practicing lawyer in criminal law at Calcutta High Court and also worked as a Trade Mark Attorney in a reputed IP Company in Singapore. She was the recipient of an ICSSR grant in 2013-14 for data collection in California, USA for comparative research on Rape Investigation & Prosecution in India and USA. She completed two research projects, firstly, ISRD-3 from 2012-2015 funded by Swiss National Science Foundation (Report available at- https://www.krc.ch/krcwp/wp-content/uploads/2019/02/ISRD_3_India_Report.pdf) and second, ICSSR Major Research Program 2018-20 on Investigation and Trial of Rape cases in the States of WB, OD and JH. Her area of specialization is criminal law and her teaching includes Interpretation of Statutes, Code of Criminal Procedure, Criminology, Penology & Victimology amongst others in LL.B. and LL.M courses. One of her noteworthy achievements was to give the keynote address on the topic of "Delhi Gang rape- The media's role as the game changer and the curious case of the BBC Documentary India's Daughter" at the Journalism Law School Fellowship, Loyola Law School, California on 11th June 2016.

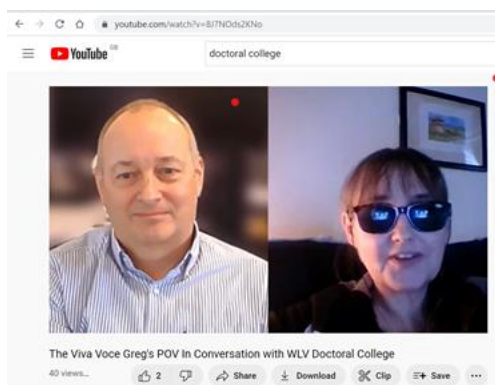

Introduction to the Evidence for Equality National Survey (EVENS)

The EVENS dataset provides unique insights into the experiences and attitudes of ethnic minorities in GB. Developed by the Centre on the Dynamics of Ethnicity (CoDE) in response to the disproportionate impacts of COVID-19, the largest and most comprehensive survey of the lives of ethnic and religious minorities in Britain for more than 25 years, EVENS explores how and why experiences of the COVID-19 pandemic varied according to ethnicity. EVENS used pioneering, robust survey methods to collect data in 2021 from 14,200 participants of whom 9,700 identify as from an ethnic or religious minority.

In this workshop we will hear from Professor Nissa Finney, University of St Andrews, Director of EVENS and one of the editors of *Racism and Ethnic Inequality in a Time of Crisis: Findings from the Evidence for Equality National Survey*. Nissa will give an overview of the survey methods and the resulting EVENS dataset, an introduction to research using the EVENS dataset, and an overview of potential areas for future research using EVENS. Dr Jennifer Buckley will outline how to access the dataset, which is freely available from the UK Data Service. The workshop will provide the opportunity for discussion and questions about the dataset.

This free online workshop, organised by the UK Data Service in collaboration with CoDE, will consist of an interactive presentation and Q&A session for those interested in exploring this valuable new resource. Two future events are planned covering teaching with an open version of the EVENS dataset and the technical challenges of making a large non-probability survey representative of the population.

We will be using Mentimeter to ask questions in this workshop so you may benefit from having a second device ready for this, such as a smartphone.

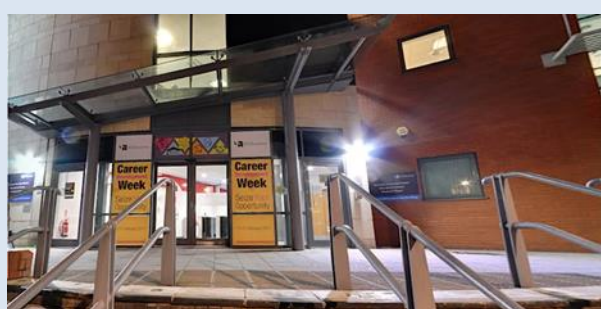

Did you know that data from major social surveys such as the British Social Attitudes survey, the Labour Force Survey and the Health Survey for England can be accessed for research and teaching?

These UK surveys provide a rich source of data from representative samples on important social and economic topics including work, family life, health, and social and political attitudes. Our collection includes surveys from the National Centre for Social Research, Office for National Statistics and other producers. In most cases, you can simply download the data once registered with the UK Data Service.

This free introductory workshop is intended for anyone who wants to learn about survey data available from the UK Data Service. The session will cover:

- the UK datasets available from the UK Data Service
- key features of survey data with examples from commonly used surveys
- how to access the data and getting further help

The webinar will consist of a 30 minute presentation, followed by a practical demonstration of the facilities to find data and a further 20 minutes for questions.

Research following the PhD, as a John Stokes Postdoctoral Fellow in the lab of Professor Paul Evans at the University of Sheffield, involved developing a platform for functional screening of flow-responsive apoptotic regulators in zebrafish.

Jovana subsequently used this model to identify mechanoreceptors regulating endothelial apoptosis in response to flow, which was the basis for a British Heart Foundation Intermediate Basic Science Research Fellowship, awarded in February 2018.

The past few years has involved a huge change in expectations for researchers in how they manage and share participants' information. There are new legal obligations, such as the GDPR regulations, as well as a greater emphasis in sharing data after the completion of a research project.

The process of anonymisation is an essential part to protect the identities of research participants while complying with these ethical and legal standards. Before sharing, archiving, or publishing data, you should ensure that all identifying and disclosive information is managed appropriately and redacted when necessary.

Join us as we critically discuss what is meant by "disclosive data" and strategies for anonymising quantitative and qualitative data. We will look specifically at key differences between anonymisation and pseudonymisation and discuss how to responsibly use, plus share, data using a three-prong strategy for protecting participants' identities.

In this interactive workshop, you will have an opportunity to develop an anonymisation plan, test your knowledge on legal and ethical obligations and discuss how to strike a balance between anonymisation (or pseudonymisation), access regulation, as well as consent. This free workshop will consist of a 90-minute session, including presentations, exercises and questions. The workshop is intended for anyone who wants to learn about data anonymisation. No preparation is necessary, however basic knowledge of research methods is assumed.

Dr Alex Radziskeuskaya is a Team Leader in the Division of Cancer Biology at the Institute of Cancer Research, London. She started at the ICR in November 2021.

Alex is originally from Belarus. In 2008, she received the Darwin Trust of Edinburgh Scholarship to pursue her studies at the University of Edinburgh, where she received her BSc with Honours in Molecular Biology. In 2014, she earned her PhD from the University of Cambridge, where she studied mechanisms of induced pluripotency at the laboratory of Dr Jose CR Silva at the Wellcome Trust – MRC Cambridge Stem Cell Institute.

For her postdoctoral research, Dr Radziskeuskaya joined the laboratory of Professor Kristian Helin at the Biotech Research and Innovation Center in Copenhagen. The overall theme of her postdoctoral work was understanding how chromatin-associated proteins regulate gene expression and cell fate decisions and how they contribute to cancer, in particular acute myeloid leukaemia.

For this work, she secured two postdoctoral fellowships: Marie Skłodowska-Curie Individual Postdoc Fellowship and EMBO Long-Term Postdoc Fellowship. In 2018, the laboratory moved to Memorial Sloan Kettering Cancer Center in New York, where she continued her research until November 2021.

The major focus of Alex's laboratory at the ICR is to understand how post-translational modifications on histone proteins regulate genome organization and stability and how they contribute to the development of cancer

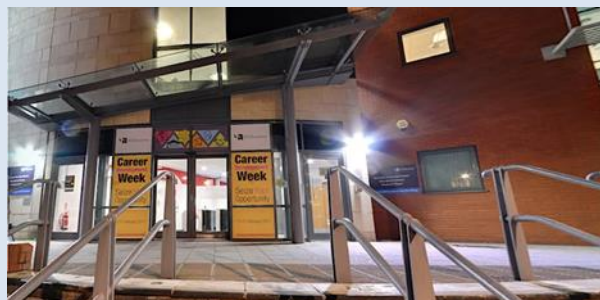

Morning Session: Statistics

09:30am - 12:30pm R16 Introduction to Statistics (Part One)

Description: The course is designed in two parts as a very brief introduction to statistics. Attendance at the first session is a prerequisite to attending part two. Part One runs on-campus on Friday 27th October, 2023 with Part Two taking place on-campus on Friday 24th November, 2023.

The overall emphasis will be on developing a basic understanding of what is statistics, why it is necessary and how to go about it. Among topics explored will be:

Descriptive statistics

Data types

Effective use of diagrams

An extremely brief introduction to hypothesis testing

An extremely brief introduction to statistical modelling

Especially with regard to the last two topics mentioned above, it is not an objective that the participants will walk away as experts in the topics, but rather that they will have some idea of the nature of the topics which they may then explore further in the future if necessary.

Whilst output from statistical software packages will be used extensively, the participants will not be taught the use of statistical software, there will be little, if any, mathematical calculations made during the course.

PM – Content: **2pm - 3.15pm: Is Your Thesis "Fit to Submit"? / Preparing Your Thesis Abstract**

Dr Benjamin Halligan will talk about the final stage of preparation for doctoral thesis submission --- taking in Abstract preparation, discussion of possible Viva examiners, and then a checklist of do's (and don'ts) to ensure that your thesis achieves outstanding presentational standards. This includes bibliography checks, formatting checks, word count matters, consistency of terminology use, document back-up strategies, working with your supervisor on the final sign-off, appendices preparation, and more. We'll be looking to mistakes common with Wolverhampton PGRs --- as picked up in Viva examination feedback. And there will be lots of opportunities for discussion around your particular research. The course is designed in two parts as a very brief introduction to statistics. Attendance at the first session is a prerequisite to attending part two.

The overall emphasis will be on developing a basic understanding of what is statistics, why it is necessary and how to go about it.

The longitudinal studies are extremely rich data sources for high impact and policy relevant research. The British Birth Cohort Studies (e.g. the National Child Development Study 1958 and The Millennium Cohort Study) follow the same group of children born in a specific year throughout their lives, tracking changes and unravelling the reasons behind them. Understanding Society is an innovative and world-leading study about life and its changes in the UK in the 21st century. The real world impact of these studies continues to be substantial. Additionally, the Covid-19 pandemic has created a defining moment for longitudinal research.

Longitudinal studies provide a unique opportunity to track both short and long term effects of the pandemic, alongside invaluable pre-pandemic measures of health and behaviour. Many longitudinal studies have added Covid-19 specific datasets and we will explore what some of these cover.

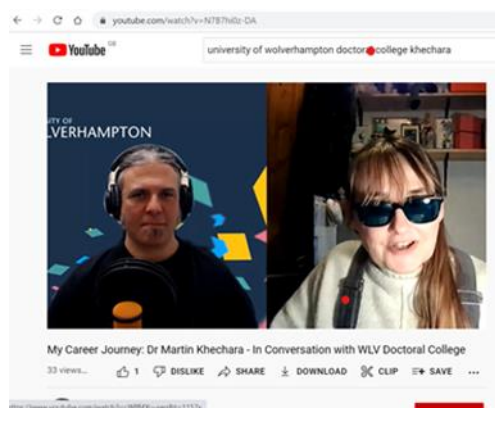

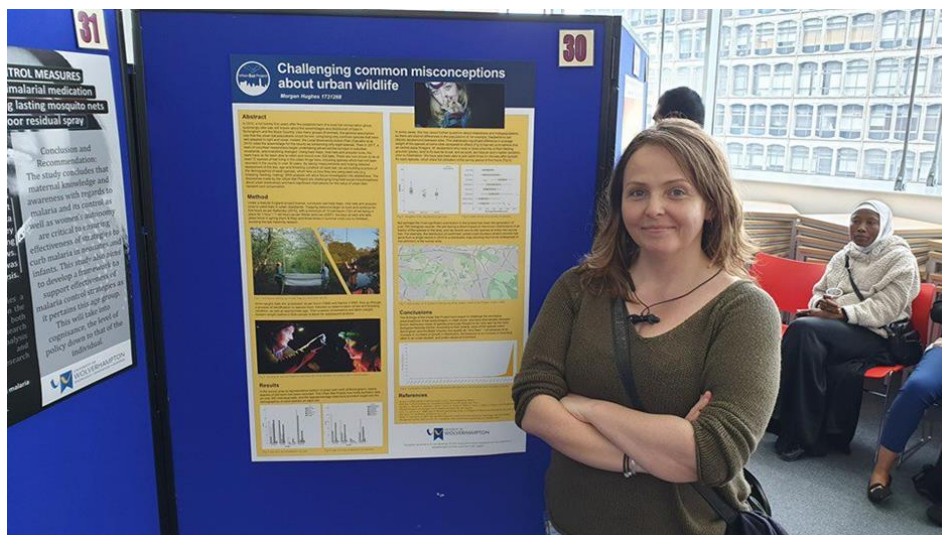

Professor de Val's research aims to develop novel strategies to modulate vessel growth. This is directly relevant to the ischemic heart, where neovascular growth is insufficient and current strategies to improve this have failed.

Having worked on different aspects of gene regulation, research now focuses on the transcriptional pathways which regulate the dynamic gene expression patterns required for correct formation and function of the mammalian vascular system.

During post-doctoral research, Sarah combined the analysis of gene enhancers (densely clustered groups of transcription factor binding motifs which regulate spatial and temporal patterns of gene transcription) with in vivo gene depletion models to describe a transcriptional pathway that regulates endothelial cell (EC) specification (De Val et al., Cell, 2008). As an independent researcher, Prof De Val's lab is focused on understanding the regulatory mechanisms controlling angiogenesis (new EC growth from existing vessels), vascular differentiation and heterogeneity.

About the Researcher Development Framework (RDF)



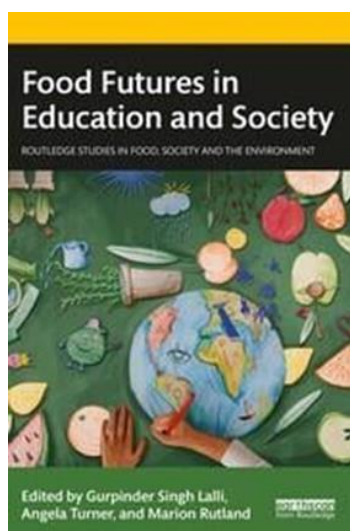
The Researcher Development Statement (RDS) sets out the knowledge, behaviours and attributes of effective and skilled researchers appropriate for a wide range of careers. The RDS is for policy makers and research organisations which provide personal, professional and career development for researchers in higher education. The Researcher Development Statement is derived from the Researcher Development Framework (RDF), a major new approach to researcher development, which aims to enhance our capacity to build the UK workforce, develop world-class researchers and build our research base.



The University of Wolverhampton subscribes to the Vitae Research Development Framework. The RDF is structured in four domains encompassing the knowledge, intellectual abilities, techniques and professional standards to do research, as well as the personal qualities, knowledge and skills to work with others and ensure the wider impact of research. Within each of the domains are three sub-domains and associated descriptors, which describe different aspects of being a researcher.
