► A journey through the years

The early years (1827-1899)

The roots of the University of Wolverhampton lie in the 19th century growth of Mechanics Institutes, which provided vocational and general education for working men, and The Wolverhampton Free Library. Teaching first began in 1851 at the School of Art.



The post-war years (1945-1968)

The post-war 'boom' in education led to a growing demand for a variety of subject areas. In 1945, a music department opened and by 1966, with student numbers at over 6,000, the College began to provide Bachelor's degrees and the first ever degree ceremony was held. Meanwhile, at Walsall, a new West Midlands College of Education was created in 1963.



The University of Wolverhampton (1992-present)

In 1992, Wolverhampton Polytechnic was granted university status and became the University of Wolverhampton. Each year over 4,000 students graduate from Wolverhampton. We continue to invest in our students, staff, alumni and in the local and international community.



Early 20th century (1900-1944)

By 1903, an educational foundation had firmly been established with over 1,300 students studying courses including coach building, house painting and pattern making. The foundation stone of the Wulfruna Building was laid by HRH Prince George in 1932 and in 1933 the Wolverhampton and Staffordshire Technical College was born.



Wolverhampton Polytechnic (1969-1991)

On 1 September 1969, the College was officially designated a polytechnic comprising five Faculties: Applied Science, Art and Design, Arts, Engineering, and Social Sciences – a further Faculty of Education was established in 1977. A merger with the West Midlands College of Education in 1991 led to the creation of what is now Walsall Campus, and further mergers with colleges led to the construction of an ambitious third campus in Telford.



The 21st century, In 2015, we were proud to unveil our most ambitious investment programme to date – a £250m plan for investment in education, training and supporting economic growth – through flagship projects like our multi-million-pound Springfield Campus.

Further developments like our Cyber Centre, opened as a joint venture with Herefordshire Council; the Marches Centre of Excellence for Health and Social Care at Telford Campus; and Screen School in Wolverhampton, demonstrate our continued investment in our students, staff, alumni and in the local and international community.

It has been another exciting year for the University of Wolverhampton, marked by many notable developments and the achievements of our students, staff and graduates.

Deana Uppal receives award from UK Prime Minister

Deana Uppal, film maker, philanthropist, entrepreneur and former Miss India UK, who featured on the cover of last year's WLW Life alumni magazine, has been awarded the Points of Light award by UK Prime Minister, Rishi Sunak.

The award recognises Deana's exceptional work through her charity, founded in 2015, the DKU Kindness Diaries Charitable Trust, in supporting poverty-stricken communities in Rajasthan, India.

The charity works to address poverty in India through a variety of initiatives, providing food, clothing, and shelter to those in need, and running education and vocational training programmes to help individuals become self-sufficient.

Alongside the charity work, Deana produced and directed a documentary which can be seen on Netflix on the Nomadic community, Gaddia Lohars, in Rajasthan: India's Forgotten People, resulting in large support for the community.

In a personal letter to Deana, Prime Minister Rishi Sunak said: "Your kindness and service to others is a wonderful demonstration of the power of the living bridge between the UK and India."

Deana said: "Receiving the Points of Light award is a great honour and fills me with immense gratitude. It is an amazing recognition of the hard work and unwavering commitment of the 'Kindness Diaries Trust' team to serve those in need. This award serves as a great inspiration and motivates us to continue making a positive impact in the world through our work. We are truly humbled and grateful for the Prime Minister's recognition and support of our mission."



Inaugural awards ceremony celebrates alumni achievements

The University of Wolverhampton held its second ever, and first in-person, Alumni Awards on Tuesday 27 June, 2023. The event took place at the University of Wolverhampton's Chancellor's Hall and was also streamed live around the world on YouTube.

The ceremony is a celebration of the achievements of the university's alumni and featured over 170 nominations made across the six award categories, also recognising the inaugural Hall of Fame inductees and an honorary award for outstanding career service.

David Wedge, deputy head of alumni relations, said: "Congratulations to all our finalists and winners. Our alumni truly are our greatest ambassadors and it's important that we continue to celebrate their successes and provide inspiration for future generations."



University awarded 4-star rating

The University has been awarded a 4-star overall rating by the QS stars awards system, additionally scoring the highest rating of 5 stars for employability facilities, inclusiveness, internationalisation, and teaching.



New research partnership furthers quest for zero emissions

The University of Wolverhampton has officially signed a £320k research agreement with local company, Mercia Group, to explore innovative technology that could help mitigate emissions from diesel generators in the future.

Mercia Group, based in Willenhall, West Midlands, specialises in a range of services including Cranes and lifting equipment, industrial doors, the supply of solar panels, battery storage, electrical wholesale, and inspections, and have just launched a range of consumable products.

The company has signed up to work with the university researchers and recruit a postdoctoral research associate in the Faculty of Science and Engineering on a two-year project which will explore the environmental challenge of moving towards zero emissions utilising facilities at the National Brownfield Institute.

Don Mead, CEO of Mercia Group, said: "This is yet another big milestone for the company. The response we've had from the university is second to none, and every direction they've pointed us in has benefited us massively.

"We are really pleased to now be working with them on this exploratory carbon neutral energy research project, which has enormous potential for providing alternative energy sources in the future which could be of magnificent benefit to the world."



Healthy funding boost secured for sport and healthcare facilities in Walsall

The University of Wolverhampton has secured nearly £6 million funding from the Office for Students (OfS) to invest in exciting advances in sport and healthcare facilities at its Walsall Campus.

The OfS is awarding £432 million in capital funding to support investment in new buildings, facilities and equipment for universities and colleges across England.

Investment in refurbishing existing facilities will create a suite of modern, multidisciplinary facilities in the university's School of Allied Health and Midwifery and the School of Sport providing state-of-the-art skills-based teaching facilities for the preparation for, and return to, active lifestyles, sport and physical activity across strength and conditioning, injury assessment, injury prevention, diagnosis, prehabilitation and rehabilitation.

The world-class multipurpose teaching and training facilities will be designed to facilitate interprofessional education, which is essential for allied health and sport & physical activity practitioners who work together in a clinical environment. following Ofsted inspection in 2021.

City of Wolverhampton

Wolverhampton has a colourful history stretching back to its foundation in 985AD by Lady Wulfruna, a prominent Staffordshire noble woman and a landowner, who was granted the land by King Æthelred II.

▶ **One of the fifty-six signatories of the American Declaration of Independence in 1776** was Button Gwinnett, a merchant who married Wolverhampton girl, Anne Bowne at St Peter's Church in 1757 before moving to America in 1762.



The World Altitude Balloon Record (without oxygen) of almost 11km (36,000ft) was set by James Glaisher and Henry Coxwell in September 1862, who took off from a site at Wolverhampton Science Park.



▶ **Queen Victoria's first public engagement since the death of Prince Albert** (in December 1861) was to Wolverhampton for the official unveiling of the statue of Prince Albert on his favourite horse, on Friday 30th November 1866. Known locally as "The Man on the 'Oss", the statue was created by sculptor Thomas Thornycroft and cost £1,150.



Originally called the People's Park, Wolverhampton's West Park was opened on 6th June 1881. The gates and railings around the park are the original Victorian ones: they survived being melted down for the war effort during WW2, unlike metal railings throughout the country.



The first automated electric traffic lights in England were originally located on an island in Princes Square in November 1927.

Wolverhampton Civic Hall built in 1936-8 by architects Lyons and Israel in a Modernistic Classical style. It was inspired by Tengbom's Stockholm Concert Hall of 1920-26.



Artist and museum curator, George Wallis, was born in Wolverhampton. He was appointed a deputy commissioner for the Great Exhibition of 1851 – a crucial spark in the development of Schools of Art. The School of Art building was opened in 1970 by Sir Charles Wheeler: the celebrated sculptor studied at Wolverhampton School of Art, part of the foundations of the University as it is now. He also sculpted the statue of Lady Wulfrun outside St. Peter's Collegiate Church.

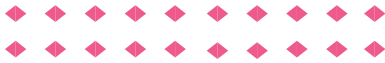

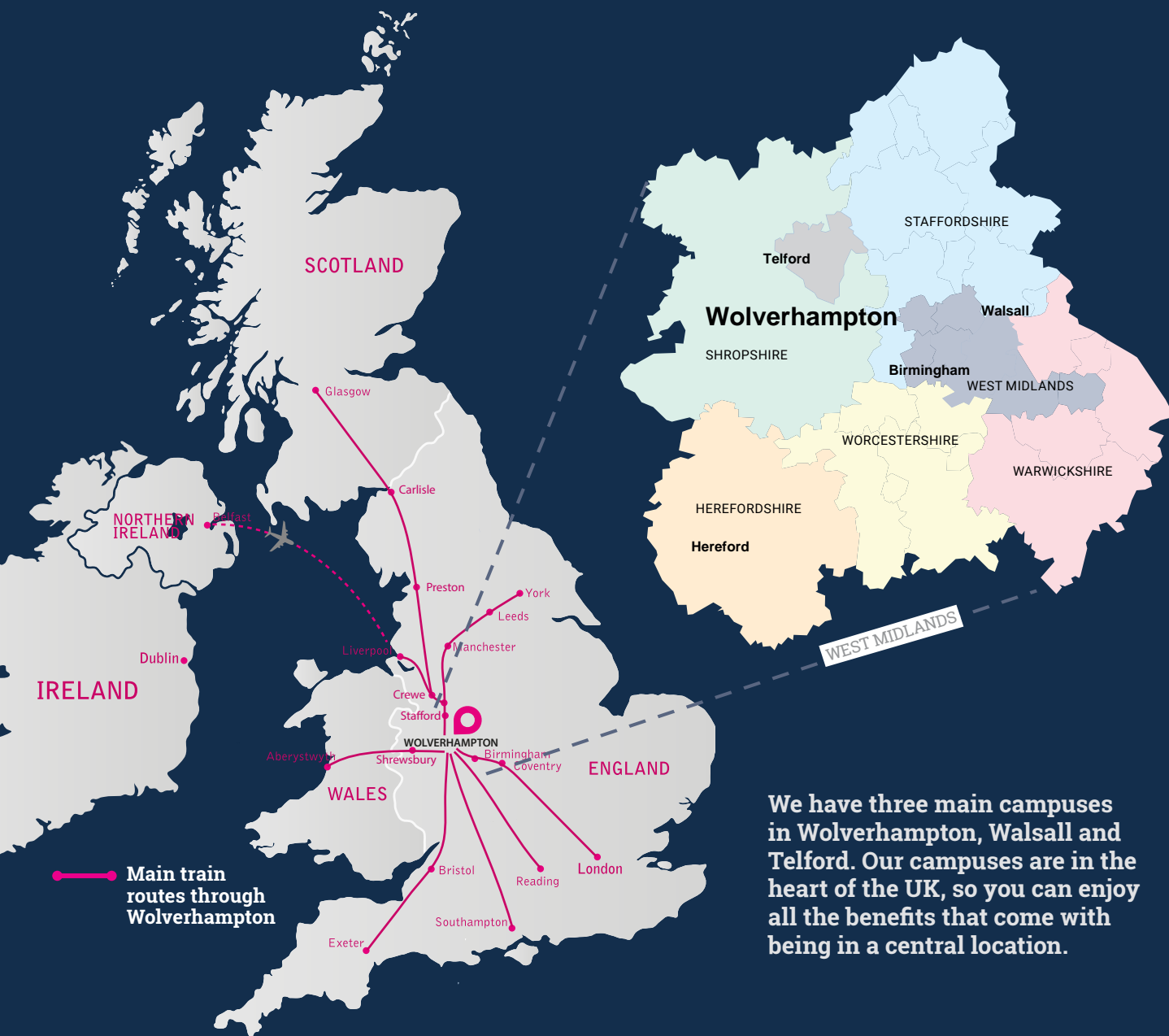

The Marches Centre of Excellence for Health and Social Care in the Angad Paul Building contains skills and simulation facilities that can be used across health and social care disciplines.

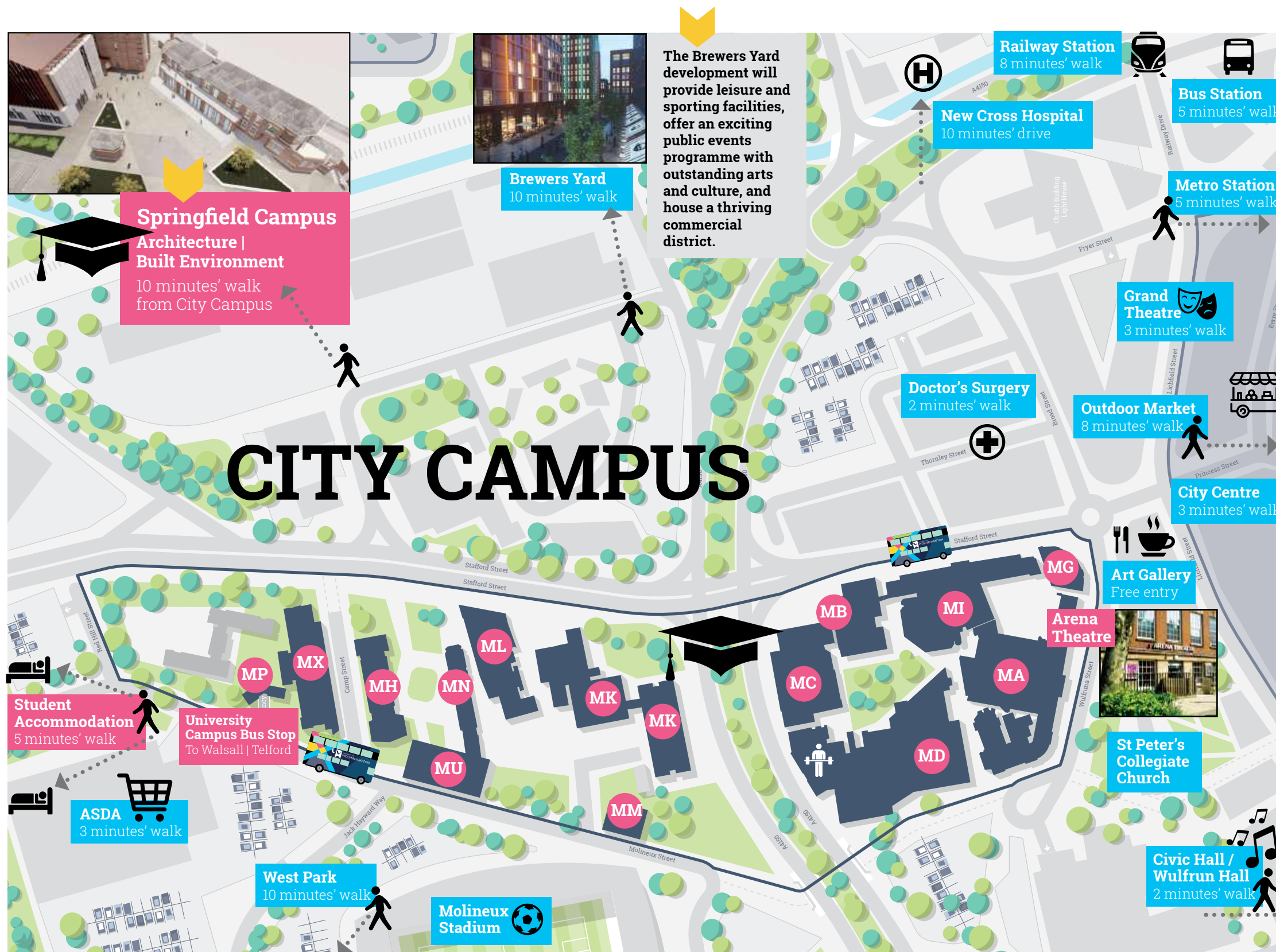

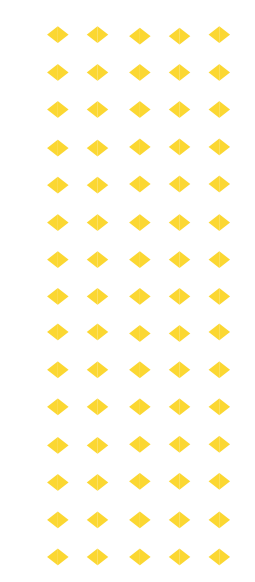

At-a-glance

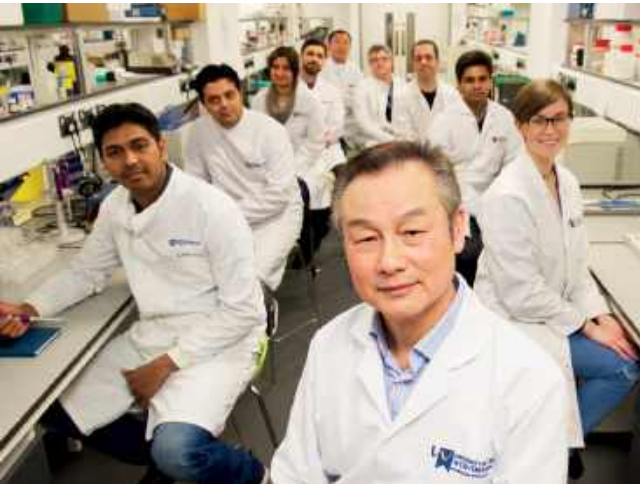
- Over half our research is considered internationally excellent or world-leading.

Research at the University of Wolverhampton has significantly grown in recent years. In REF2021 we submitted to four new subject areas, with 75% more staff than REF2014. The results show that more than half of our research is judged to be internationally excellent (3) or world-leading (4).

This fantastic result reflects the important research taking place across the University, which is making a real difference in people's lives. It's rewarding to see this work internationally recognised.



Sixteen submitted subject areas have research of a world-leading standard, including the University's work on changing perceptions of the Black Country, eliminating gender and race discrimination, and improving health outcomes for all.

Deposits

All international applicants must pay a deposit before we can issue your Confirmation of Acceptance for Studies (CAS). The deposit amount varies depending on which country you are applying from. Please ensure you check your offer letter for more information. If you are unsure about your deposit fee, please contact us by emailing: international@wlv.ac.uk

Other costs

Visa costs

Information on visa costs can be found on the UKCISA website ukcisa.org.uk

Immigration Health Surcharge (IHS)

this fee has been introduced by the UK Government and you need to pay the healthcare surcharge if you're applying for a visa or immigration application for more than 6 months. Students will need to pay £470 per year, this charge will be applied when a visa application is made.

Living costs

All students must provide UKVI with evidence they can pay their living costs, maintenance, and tuition fees.

- ◆ You will need to provide evidence of 9 months of living expenses at **£1,023** per month (**£9,207** per year).
- ◆ If your course lasts for less than nine months, you will need **£1,023** per month of the course (eg. for six months, you need **£6,138**). Remember: this is in addition to the outstanding balance of your tuition fees.
- ◆ If you will be bringing dependants with you to the UK, you will also need to meet a financial requirement as part of your visa application. Dependants are required to have **£680** per month (e.g. **£6,120** for a nine month course or **£4,080** for a six month course).

Financial evidence

You must provide a bank statement that covers 28 days. The money must be in your bank account or your parents' personal account; it cannot be in any other relative or friend's account (unless they meet the UKVI definition of an official financial sponsor).

If you are using your parents' bank account, you will also be required to submit additional supporting documents with your application, such as your birth certificate and a letter from your parents confirming their relationship to you and that they give you their consent to use their account for funding your studies and living costs.

The money must be in the account at the time you apply for the visa and must have been constantly in the account for a minimum of 28 days before the date of your visa application. The final closing balance cannot be more than 31 days before the date of your visa application.

Scholarships

The University of Wolverhampton is committed to investing in student talent from all over the world to create the best opportunities for students to reach their potential. We have a wide range of scholarships available to students who can demonstrate academic and personal excellence. Below are just some of the scholarship schemes available:

Global Opportunities Regional Scholarships

The University of Wolverhampton has 20 scholarships of £3,000 per year for students from the following regions: Sub-Saharan Africa, Middle East and North Africa, East Asia and Pakistan, Europe, The Americas.

Alumni Scholarship

All University of Wolverhampton graduates who choose to remain at the University for their postgraduate taught Programmes receive an Alumni Scholarship of £2,000. If you achieve a First Class degree, the Alumni Scholarship is valued at £3,000.

Chevening Scholarship

University of Wolverhampton is proud to be a Chevening partner. Chevening is the UK Government's international awards scheme aimed at developing global leaders. Funded by the Foreign and Commonwealth Office (FCO) and partner organisations.

Commonwealth Scholarship

The University in partnership with Commonwealth Commission are proud to offer the Commonwealth Shared Scholarship, the Scholarship is for MSc candidates from low and middle-income Commonwealth countries to spend 12 months at a UK university as part of their doctoral studies in their home country.

Visa and immigration

Pre-CAS interview

Some applicants may be required to attend a Pre-CAS Interview before they can apply for their CAS. Please contact us, if you are unsure whether you need to have an interview or visit the e:vision portal for more information. The Pre-CAS team will contact you and schedule your interview.

Visa/entry clearance

Immigration Rules and the requirements for each visa category can change with very little notice so always check the current guidance at the time you are getting ready to apply.

Generally, most international students will need a Student route visa to study in the UK but please also check the Government's [Visas and Immigration webpages](#) as they have further details about the types of visas available and who they are suitable for.

Most nationals from non-EEA states who wish to come to the UK to study courses longer than six months are required to obtain a visa (also called 'entry clearance') before coming to the UK.

There may also be other requirements you need to meet, such as having a TB health certificate or Academic Technology Approval Scheme (ATAS) certificate. These requirements may depend on your nationality or the course you intend to study.

When and how to apply

The application process will be online or paper-based, according to which country you live in. To check which procedure is relevant for you, please visit:

[gov.uk/check-uk-visa](https://www.gov.uk/check-uk-visa)

You can apply for the visa at any time in the three months leading up to your course start date. Do not leave it until shortly before you travel to apply for your visa as it may take longer than expected to process the application. It is your responsibility to allow yourself enough time for your visa to be processed before you make your travel arrangements. Make sure you don't lose any information by saving your application regularly. Once you've finished, print a copy off for your records.

The application form is completed online and then you will need to attend an appointment in order to have your biometric data captured and to submit your documents/ attend an interview.

To apply for your Student route Visa entry clearance overseas, you will need to find your closest Visa Application Centre and check with them what their procedure for visa applications is.

To apply for your student visa in the UK, you must first make an appointment with our Visa and Immigration Support team for an assessment of your documents. You will then be given assistance with the online application.

Please remember other documents required (originals only) are:

- ◆ your passport or travel document, preferably valid for at least six months after your date of departure for the UK
- ◆ two recent passport photographs
- ◆ your CAS number
- ◆ financial evidence to show that you have enough money to pay for your tuition fees and living expenses. This is equal to the remaining tuition fees you need to pay for the year, plus a total of £9,207 to cover your living expenses (also known as maintenance)

Your VISA responsibilities

Please note, it is a requirement of your visa that you attend your lectures and seminars and engage with all academic requirements (for example sitting exams and/or submitting coursework). Failure to attend regularly or submit assignments will result in your visa sponsorship being withdrawn, and your visa will be curtailed (cancelled).



How to apply: a 10-step guide

1

Apply

There are two easy ways to apply:

- **Direct to the University** – complete and submit an online application form. You need to include your personal statement and scans of your original academic transcripts and certificates. We submit your application to UCAS on your behalf.
 - **Application via UCAS** – if you're applying for an undergraduate degree or a Higher National Diploma (HND), you can apply directly through the UK's Universities and Colleges Admissions Service (UCAS) at: ucas.com
 - **Application via an agent** – our in-country representatives can help you make your application and apply for a visa, and give advice on studying abroad.

Get your offer

Providing that you have submitted all the correct information, you will receive one of the following decisions by email:

- **Unconditional offer** – You meet the entry criteria.
- **Conditional offer** – You still need to complete your current qualifications, or submit outstanding documents. Your place will be reserved until you meet the rest of the entry criteria.
- **Alternative course** – You do not meet the entry criteria for the course you applied for, but you are suitable for another course.
- **Reject** – You do not meet the entry criteria. We will always offer an alternative course where possible.

3

Meet your conditions

- If you are holding an unconditional offer, you have already met all of the conditions and you will be eligible to proceed to apply for your visa at the appropriate time.
- If you have a conditional offer, then you will need to email your outstanding documents to: admissions@wlv.ac.uk or upload them through your e:Vision account.
- Before we issue your CAS, you may be required to have a Pre-Cas interview. The purpose of the Pre-Cas interview is to ascertain that the student's intention to study in a university in the UK is genuine. Once you receive an unconditional offer from us, we automatically add you to the Pre-CAS interview scheduling list. The Pre-CAS team will contact you and schedule your interview.

4

Accept your offer

If you're applying to us directly or through UCAS, log in to e:Vision or UCAS Track to accept your offer. If you're applying through an in-country representative, they'll do this for you.

5

Book your accommodation

Once you have accepted your offer (conditional or unconditional), you will receive an email inviting you to book accommodation online.

6

Request confirmation of acceptance for studies (CAS)

A CAS is an e-document and confirms that you have been accepted onto a full-time degree course at an educational sponsor in the UK. Once you have an unconditional offer and are within 6 months of the

course start date, you will be able to request your CAS at which point further checks will be undertaken to check eligibility for visa.

7

Arrange your finances and prepare your documents

You will need to arrange for the remainder of your fees (minus the deposit) and living costs to be in your, or your parent or legal guardian's, bank account for 28 consecutive days. You will also need to pay a healthcare surcharge, which is currently £470 per year of your course. You can find out more information and pay this charge online at: gov.uk.

Depending on your country of domicile, you may also need to arrange for a TB (tuberculosis) test to be carried out. Depending on the course you have applied for, you may need to apply for an Academic Technology Approval Scheme (ATAS) certificate. Visa and immigration

Once you've met the financial conditions and provided all relevant documents to the University, you will be issued with a CAS number and can then apply for your Student Route visa.

Depending on when you apply, you may need to use the visa priority service to ensure your application will be processed ahead of your arrival for Welcome Week.

If you have a conditional offer and do not meet visa conditions, a deposit refund can be requested subject to terms and conditions.

Credibility interview

You may be invited to attend a credibility interview with the Home Office.

10

Arrange your travel
