Since late 2023, Dan has been undertaking community research in Peterborough, Wisbech and Boston, examining contested concepts of community, connection and place-making across the Fens area. This long-term research, funded by the Open University, with the formal purpose of producing a report and a short-film and regional development. Scientific research and teaching are increasingly influenced by computational tools, methods and paradigms. The social sciences are no different, with many new forms of social data only available or practical through computational means (Kitchen, 2014).

While social science research has always been marked by technological approaches to some degree, the field of computational social science involves the use of tools, data and methods that require a different skill set and mindset.

This free workshop is an introduction to computational social science. It offers attendees a chance to understand and discuss what computational social science is, what it is good for, how to become a computational social scientist, and the basic steps to follow in an ideal computational social science research project.

Much research data - even sensitive data - can be shared ethically and legally. 

How Does God Speak?: The English Roman Catholic Cinema at the time of Vatican II

This talk draws on current research on English Roman Catholic cinema, 1960-2000, tracking the ways in which films have presented, interrogated, problematised and advanced Catholic culture. This particular talk considers Carol Reed's The Agony and the Ecstasy – dramatizing the fraught relationship between Michelangelo and Pope Julius II in relation to the painting of the Sistine Chapel – in relation to wider theorising about the idea of divine revelation in the contemporary world, articulated via the Second Ecumenical Council of the Vatican (1962-1965) and the 1965 encyclical Gaudium et Spes. In short: how goes God speak to modern people, as the secular age tilts against narratives of miracles and visions? How does English cinema grapple with this?

The talk will consider evolving Vatican positions on cinema in general, of Divini Illius Magistri, Vigilanti Cura and Miranda Prorsus, and the importance of the arts, including the recent interventions "The Global Aesthetics of the Catholic Imagination" and "Letter of His Holiness Pope Francis on the Role of Literature in Formation."

Crossing the Science/Culture Divide: Posthumanism in Blade Runner and Blade Runner 2049

The posthuman view, as Katherine Hayles explains, 'privileges informational pattern over material instantiation [...]; considers consciousness [...] as an evolutionary upstart trying to claim it is the whole show when in actuality it is only a minor sideshow [...]; thinks of the body as the original prosthesis we all learn to manipulate, so that extending or replacing the body with other prostheses becomes a continuation of a process that began before we were born [...]; and reconfigures the human being so that it can be seamlessly articulated with intelligent machines' (1999: 3). Like its 1982 antecedent, Blade Runner (Scott), Blade Runner 2049 (Villeneuve, 2017) features a range of such posthumans, albeit certain of these new formulations are fundamentally different to the bioengineered humanoids of Ridley Scott's earlier film. While the replicants are identical to humans, except for their emotions and their four year life span, the posthumans of Villeneuve's sequel also manifest in virtual form. Moreover, these holographic bodies have the capacity to integrate with other forms, not only disrupting any sense of autonomy and self but also lending a spiritual element to the posthuman being. The replicants of Scott's film were conceived in an era when advances in assisted reproductive techniques, cloning, and genetic manipulation were at the forefront of scientific developments, leading to the replication of Dolly the Sheep in 1997. In contrast, the later sequel tends to reflect the digital zeitgeist and whilst, as Umberto Eco notes, the hologram was 'invented in the 1950s' (1986: 3), here it takes on a more independent form, acting autonomously in line with innovations in digital technology, robotics, and motion capture. This talk aligns the changes in posthuman form of the two films with contemporaneous scientific discourse, charting the development of cloning and assisted reproductive techniques in the 1970s through to construction of the fully digital body. It argues that even as both films maintain a focus on corporeality as it is constituted in the post-1970s bodily turn, the latter begins to reflect digital advances. In other words, referring to the work of Raymond Williams, it reflects an emergent structure of feeling associated with digital technology that is not yet fully articulated.



About the Researcher Development Framework (RDF)







