1.1.1	Academic Regulations must be approved by Academic Board and will be reviewed annually by them or a designated subcommittee.										
1.1.2	Where a course has any additional or alternative rules set by a Professional Statutory and Regulatory Body (PSRB) or where there are specific legal requirements these will take priority over the University's Academic Regulations.										
1.1.3	All awards offered by the University must be approved by the Board of Governors and listed in <u>University Bye-Law No. 5</u> before they can be advertised.										
1.1.4	Any exemptions to these regulations must be formally approved by Academic Board or a designated subcommittee. A list of all approved exemptions will be held centrally. Exemptions will:										
	 apply throughout the period of validation, be listed in the Course Specification, be published in the Course Guide. 										
1.1.5	In very exceptional circumstances, the Chair of the Academic Board may agree to vary the provisions of the Academic Regulations. This may include the approval of alternative forms of assessment, the variation of the academic calendar and the continuation of students with deferred assessments.										
1.2	Course Framework										
	urse framework describes how courses will be structured, delivered, and monitored. Within ulatory framework:										
1.2.1	Courses will meet the academic standards set out in the Framework for Higher Education Qualifications in England, Wales and Northern Ireland (FHEQ) (QAA, 2024) and where relevant, a PSRB.										
1.2.2	Courses will use the Credit Accumulation and Transfer System (CATS). The validation process will determine the proportions of notional learning hours including formal contact, assessment, guided study and independent learning. The University also recognises the European Credit Transfer System (ECTS).										
1.2.3	Courses will be taught in English, unless the course is validated to teach students other languages										
1.2.4	Courses will be designed to ensure the effective assessment of technical proficiency in the English language, in a manner relevant to the level and content of the course, except where the course is assessing a language which is not English or could be demonstrated to be in contravention of the requirements of the Equality Act 2020.										

1.2.5 Courses will have a Course Specification and a Course Academic Calendar which must be approved through the Course Approval process and published to students. This includes the

approval of non-standard calendars for delivery of provision with academic collaborative partners and/or to support the delivery of professional courses.

The Course Specification will specify:

- The modules to be taken and which of these are "Independent study" modules.
- All award titles (final and interim)
- Course learning outcomes
- Any additional requirements for the award.

Any variation to the Course Specification or the approved Academic Calendar for a course must be approved by Academic Board or its delegated authority in accordance with approved quality procedures.

- 1.2.6 Courses will be studied over one or more academic years with each year divided into semesters. The University will publish a University Academic Calendar annually which will include dates for the current academic year and the projected calendars for the next three years (these may be subject to change). Where a course has approval for a non-standard calendar, for example where a non-standard calendar is approved for collaborative or professional courses, a calendar specific to the course and location of delivery will be provided to students.
- 1.2.7 Courses will be approved, through the Course Approval process, to be delivered in one or more of the following Modes of Study:
 - Full time consisting of 120 credits per academic year
 - Accelerated Full Time consisting of 180 in a 12-month period
 - Part time consisting of up to 80 credits per academic year.
- 1.2.8 Courses will have at least 33% difference between module diets for courses with different titles. In calculating the difference, the following will not be included:
 - Level 3 Foundation Year modules
 - Independent study modules.

For bracketed course titles, there must be at least 20% difference between module diets. On similarly named routes these will typically share the same diets at levels 4 and 5. At least 80 credits of the specialist modules must be at level 6.

No two courses will have the same title.

- 1.2.9 Courses will be made up of a specified number of credit bearing modules and will be:
 - Single Subject Specialist in which the majority of modules are from a single subject area.
 - Joint in which students will study an even number of modules from two or more specified subject areas.

In addition, Undergraduate Honours Degree courses can be:

- With Foundation Year in which students will commence their studies at level 3.
- With Sandwich Year in which students will undertake a specified period of supervised work experience as part of the course.

1.2.10 Courses will be appointed an Award Board in accordance with the <u>Code of Practice on</u>

<u>Assessment Boards</u>, which will be required to confirm that the University regulations have been correctly applied in determining awards and any associated classifications.

- 1.2.11 Courses will be reviewed through Continuous Monitoring and Improvement processes to ensure that they:
 - Are up to date.
 - Provide educational challenge.
 - Are coherent.
 - Are effectively delivered.
 - Are appropriate to the subject matter.
 - Require students to develop relevant skills.

Courses will be subject to periodic review within a maximum of 5 years of initial validation or the previous periodic review.

- 1.2.12 Through the initiation of project and solution-based independent study, Undergraduate Honours Degree courses will enable students to demonstrate the ability to:
 - apply the methods and techniques learned,
 - manage their own learning and
 - communicate this effectively.

1.3 Module Framework

Modules are credit bearing, discrete units of assessed learning, at a given level with specified learning outcomes which contribute to the learning outcomes of the course.

The module framework describes how modules will be structured, delivered, and monitored.

- 1.3.1 | Courses will be designed to deliver learning through:
 - 20 credit modules or multiples thereof,
 - 120 credit modules.

Formal exemptions will be required for any proposals requesting to adopt alternative module credit structures. These must be approved by Academic Board or its delegated authority.

- 1.3.2 Every module has a distinct set of learning outcomes that reflect the level of study as specified in the FHEQ. These will be listed in a Module Guide.
- 1.3.3 | Modules will be either **core** or **option**.
 - Core modules are compulsory.
 - **Option** modules are available in an option pool from which the student will choose which module(s) they wish to study.

The number and availability of option modules must be listed in the relevant Course Guide.

1.3.4 | Some modules will also be:

• Pre-requisite – these must be studied and passed before a specified module at the next level may be studied. • Co-requisite - these must be studied either at the same time (i.e., same semester) or in the same academic year as another module and at the same level of study. • **Prohibited** – these cannot be studied in combination with other specified modules. These will be clearly identified in the Course Guide 1.3.5 All modules will include at least one summative assessment designed to enable students to demonstrate that the module learning outcomes have been met. Module Guides will include the number and type of all assessments being used. Admissions 2 These regulations include essential details about the admissions requirements by which all taught courses and modules are governed. They should be read in conjunction with the Admissions Terms and Conditions presented to applicants as part of the admissions process and Admissions Complaints process (see; https://www.wlv.ac.uk/study-here/how-to-apply/). 2.1.1 Course information will be made available online to enable informed choices to be made by applicants. 2.1.2 The University will inform prospective students as soon as possible of any significant changes to a course which may occur from the time of the offer being made and enrolment and will inform successful applicants of the arrangements for enrolment, registration, and induction. 2.1.3 For applicants outside the UK, additional statutory requirements will operate and take precedence over the Academic Regulations. These requirements will be communicated to applicants by the University as part of the admissions process. 2.2 Application to the University 2.2.1 The University will publish Terms and Conditions of Admission which, with the specific information provided to an applicant in the Offer Pack, will form the basis of the contract between the student and the University. 2.2.2 All applicants to the University will be required to follow relevant course application processes. 2.2.3 The University will not admit or allow the continuation of study for any person found to have made a fraudulent application and/or breached other standards and requirements specified by a PSRB (where relevant). 2.2.4 Applicants who have previously been excluded from any course in the University for reasons of discipline, academic misconduct, professional misconduct, or fitness to practise will have no right to study at the University again.

2.2.5	Applicants who have previously been discontinued from any course at the University for any reason will not be permitted to return to study for a minimum of one year. At this point they may apply again to the University. Decisions on such applications will be made on a case-by-case basis and will take into consideration the applicant's previous academic record.										
2.3	Entry with Recognition of Prior Learning (RPL)										
2.3.1	Students may be admitted to the University with accredited prior learning where they have previously successfully completed relevant study at higher education level, in the UK or abroad.										
2.3.2	Students may be admitted with accredited experiential learning based on relevant prior learning, which has occurred outside a formal course of study, which may include incompany training or relevant work experience.										
2.3.3	The assessment of prior learning will be conducted in accordance with the <u>Guidelines for the Recognition of Prior Learning</u> , as approved by Academic Board.										
2.3.4	Credits acquired from a previous University of Wolverhampton qualification may normally only be used once as RPL for entry onto any future University of Wolverhampton qualification. The RPL credits given must be relevant to the course's current Learning Outcomes. The total credit and level value of awarded RPL will be recorded on the student's record.										
2.3.5	Any grades associated with previous University of Wolverhampton study may only be included in the final classification once, where it has not been used for a classified award previously. Previously classified credits from the University of Wolverhampton or RPL from other institutions will not be individually recorded and are excluded from the final classification calculations, except where 6.2.4 applies.										
2.3.6	The minimum number of University of Wolverhampton credits students must study, and pass can be found in Appendix A.										
3.	Registration and Enrolment										
This sec	ction details the regulations which relate to student registration and enrolment.										
3.1	Registration										
_	ation (ATR) is a one-time automated process which takes place once an applicant accepts the itional offer of a place on a course and becomes a student.										
3.1.1	Students shall be registered on their course until they: Complete the course. Withdraw Are discontinued or excluded by the University or Reach the permitted maximum registration period.										

3.1.2	Students who are not registered are not fully covered by relevant health and safety policies and will therefore be excluded from any learning activities and will not have access to some facilities.
3.2	Changes to Registration
3.2.1	Mode of Study - Students can request to change their mode of study to any mode of study validated for their course.
	The University may require students to temporarily change their mode of study from full time to part time in accordance with the Progression Regulations (see 5.2.2).
	The University may require students who have outstanding assessments to submit from the previous year due to approved extenuating circumstances, to change their mode of study to External Student, where they are registered only to submit the outstanding assessments without attendance.
3.2.2	Withdrawal – Students can choose to withdraw from their course early and exit with an interim award. This must be formally requested by the student in the student portal or the partner institution should confirm any withdrawals directly to the University prior to invoice periods.
	After one year, a student who has chosen to exit their course with an interim award can reapply to the University, to study for a higher award on the same course and an application for recognition of prior learning can be made by the applicant in line with the limitations specified in Appendix A. Decisions on such applications will be made on a case-by-case basis.
3.2.3	Students can request a transfer to an alternative course and qualification at the same level providing they:
	 Meet the entry criteria for the new course, and
	 Can complete the new course within the maximum registration period set for the original course.
3.2.4	Where a student requests a transfer to a course with a Professional, Statutory and Regulatory Body (PSRB) requirement the accepting Faculty will ensure that:
	 The same selection and recruitment criteria, as those for new entrants, are applied. PRSB notification requirements are met. Agreement to the transfer does not affect the availability of places on the course for new entrants.
3.3	Registration Periods
Registra course.	ation periods define the maximum length of time that a student can study at each level of their
3.3.1	All students who enrol on a credit rated course validated by the University of Wolverhampton will be registered for the highest award validated for that course.

3.3.2 Maximum registration periods will be defined for each award and interim award offered by the University. See Appendix A

Where registration periods differ from those in Appendix A, this will be stated in the relevant Course Guide.

3.3.3 The maximum registration period for the lowest credit rated interim award (University Statement of Credit) is one academic year.

Students who do not achieve any credits within their first year of study will have reached the maximum registration period of an interim award and will not be permitted to continue the course.

- 3.3.4 A student's maximum registration period will be recalculated when required to take into consideration:
 - Recognition for Prior Learning (RPL)
 - Changes to mode of study.
 - Voluntary or enforced Break in Study (see 3.6)
 - Temporary Suspension of Studies
 - A break in study for any of the following:
 - o mandatory jury service
 - o maternity, paternity shared parental leave, or adoptive leave

Students who are required by an award board to temporarily transfer to part time (5.2.2) will not have their maximum registration period re-calculated.

3.3.5 A maximum registration period can be extended where there is evidence to demonstrate that exceptional circumstances, outside of the student's control, have disrupted their progression and where there is good reason to believe that an extension would enable the student to progress to the next level or achieve an award.

Any extension to a maximum registration period of more than one month must be requested by either:

- the Course Leader or Link Tutor, in advance of the end of the maximum registration period or
- The Complaints and Student Casework through the Academic Appeal or Complaints procedures.

All extension requests must be approved by the Director of Registry Services. Extensions to maximum registration periods will be granted for no longer than 12 months at a time.

3.4 Enrolment

Enrolment takes place at the start of the course and is the process through which a student confirms they agree to abide by all University regulations and to the terms of the <u>Tuition Fee Liability & Credit Control Policy</u>.

3.4.1 Students are responsible for ensuring that they are fully enrolled on the correct course by the published course start date. For all students, and in exceptional circumstances where there is evidence the University is responsible for delaying a student's enrolment, the deadline may be extended. All such decisions will be made on a case-by-case basis.

- 3.4.2 New students who do not enrol within the first six weeks of their course start date must use the student portal to either:
 - Formally request to defer their studies,
 - Formally request a "Break in Study"

Or

• Formally request to be withdrawn.

Students who do not do any of the above will have their registration withdrawn.

- 3.4.3 Continuing students who do not wish to study in the current academic year must use the student portal to either:
 - Formally request a "Break in Study,

Or

• Formally request to be withdrawn

Students who do not choose either option will be assumed to be continuing with the course. Where a student withdraws and has achieved academic credit an Award Board or its delegated authority will, at the earliest opportunity, consider their eligibility for any relevant interim qualification.

Partners are responsible for ensuring that any students who do not wish to continue are formally withdrawn within six weeks of the start of their academic year.

The University will communicate any changes to key policies to its partners and students in a timely manner.

- 3.4.4 When students enrol, they must confirm acceptance of the terms of the university's <u>Tuition</u>

 Fee Liability & Credit Control Policy and must ensure that all academic related fees for which they are liable under these terms are paid within the year that they are due.
- 3.4.5 Any assessment submitted by a student who is not enrolled will not considered valid and will not be marked.
- 3.4.6 It is a student's' responsibility to:
 - ensure that the personal information held by the University is accurate and kept up to date.
 - formally notify the University through the student portal if they choose to:
 - Take a Break in Study
 - Withdraw
 - Transfer to another course or another Institution.

3.5 Module Registration

Module Registration is the process through which students confirm which modules they intend to study in an academic year.

3.5.1 Students must confirm which core and option (where applicable) modules they will be studying within the first three weeks of teaching of each academic year.

Where continuing students have core modules only they will be automatically registered prior to the commencement of that level. Where option modules exist students will be required to register their own modules in e:Vision.

3.5.2	Where applicable, students may request a change to their option module registrations, within the first two weeks of teaching. All requests for change must be approved and processed by Registry Services.
3.5.3	Where a module has a pre-requisite (see 1.3.4) students must ensure that they have passed this before they commence study on the next module. If the pre-requisite has not been passed credit will not be granted for any assessed work submitted.
3.5.4	Where a module has a co-requisite (see 1.3.4) students must ensure that both modules are registered for study in the same academic year.
3.5.5	Where a course has a prohibited combination of modules students must ensure that they are not registered to study that combination.
3.5.6	Students are expected to study the number of credits specified for their award or interim award (See Appendix A). Students are not permitted to register additional modules for the purpose of studying additional credits to improve their final results/classification.
3.6	Break in Study (previously known as Leave of Absence)
	ak in Study" is defined as an authorised period when a student chooses to, or is ed to temporarily withdraw from their studies.
3.6.1	Students taking a break in study will remain registered on their course but will not be enrolled and should not attend University to study or undertake assessment.
3.6.2	Requests for a Break in Study will be processed in accordance with the Break in Study Policy and Procedure
3.6.3	Students can apply to take a Break in Study for a maximum of four semesters, or two academic years.
3.6.4	Students can also apply for an additional Break in Study due to: Mandatory jury duty service Maternity/Paternity/Parental/Adoptive Leave.
3.6.5	The University can require a student to take a mandatory break in study if, through the provisions of the <u>Support to Study procedure</u> , it is decided that this is in the student's best interest.
3.6.6	The University can enforce a break in study through the Temporary Suspension procedure, as an outcome to the Student Code of Conduct and Disciplinary Procedure or as part of the

Tuition Fee & Credit Control Policy.

3.6.7	Students can be required to fulfil specified conditions or provide specific assurances as a condition of their return to study in cases where the break in study was due to: • personal/extenuating circumstances which affected the student's ability to study, • a decision made through any of the following procedures: - Support to Study - Temporary Suspension - Student Code of Conduct - Fitness to Practice - Tuition Fee & Credit Control Policy
3.6.8	In all cases of a break in study the maximum registration period will be extended by the same amount.
3.6.9	The University cannot guarantee continuation on the same course and/or modules following a break from study. The University will inform students on a break from study if there are material changes to their course or modules in line with the Terms and Conditions of Admission.
3.6.10	Where a student takes a Break in Study before completing a module, any summative assessment which is passed will be carried forward when the student returns, if there have been no changes to the assessment requirements. Students must still submit and pass any other remaining outstanding assessments for the module.

4 Assessment

This section details the regulations which relate to the assessment of a student's academic performance.

- 4.1.1 To gain academic credit, a student must demonstrate that they have achieved specified learning outcomes. Academic credit will only be awarded to students through:
 - Accreditation of Recognition of Prior Learning (see 2.3)
 - Successful completion of module summative assessments that meet the specified learning outcomes.
 - Limited compensation (see 4.6)
- 4.1.2 Assessment Review Boards have delegated authority on behalf of Academic Board for ensuring regulations are correctly applied for modules and assessments. Detail of the boards' scope and terms of reference are in the Code of Practice on Assessment Boards.

4.2 Grading

The University uses grading schemes for recording the results of summative assessment and overall module results. These are aligned to the <u>University Level and Mark Descriptors</u>.

4.2.1 All modules will have one or more summative assessment. Collectively the assessments must allow the student to demonstrate that they have met the module learning outcomes.

Assessments will be either:

• Elements - Students will not have to achieve a passing grade in each element but must achieve a passing grade overall for the group of elements, to demonstrate that the learning outcomes have been met.

Or

- Components Students must pass all components to pass the module overall and to demonstrate that the learning outcomes have been met.
- 4.2.2 | Module Guides will clearly specify if a module is assessed using components or elements.

Where a module has multiple assessments, these will be assessed as elements, unless the course has an exemption approved by Academic Board or a designated subcommittee.

- 4.2.3 Where a module is made up of more than one assessment, the average overall grade will be calculated to a maximum of two decimal points.
- 4.2.4 Module Guides will clearly specify the weighting of each summative assessment, in relation to the module. Summative assessment marks will be added together, according to their weighting, to give an overall module grade.

- 4.2.5 Grades will be calculated to a maximum of two decimal points and the final overall grades will be rounded up or down as follows:
 - 0.50 0.99 rounded up
 - 0.01–0.49 rounded down
- 4.2.6 Undergraduate summative assessment and module results will be recorded using the following percentage mark scheme:

If approved during course validation, some summative assessments or modules may be recorded as Pass or Fail only.

4.2.8 If a student is unable through disability or injury to be assessed by the methods specified in the Module Guide, and where PSRB requirements permit, alternative but equivalent assessments will be designed in consultation with the Faculty Enabling Tutors and Disability and Inclusion and/or through the Support to Study procedures.

4.3 Fit to Sit and Extenuating Circumstances

- 4.3.1 The University operates a Fit to Sit policy. When a student sits/submits an assessment they are declaring through the submission process that they are fit to do so in accordance with the University's Fit to Sit and Extenuating Circumstances Policy.
- 4.3.2 Where a student believes they have a valid reason (such as illness) for not submitting/sitting a summative assessment, they must follow the University's Fit to Sit and Extenuating Circumstances Policy.

4.3.3	Students with approved extenuating circumstances on the first sit of a piece of summative assessment (where that work has not been submitted) are expected to submit/sit the assessment at the next published opportunity.
	If they do not do so, or they fail the assessment they will be required to resit the assessment (i.e., take the assessment again). The grade for a resit assessment will be awarded in accordance with Section 4.5 of these regulations
4.4	Late Submissions and Extensions
4.4.1	Requests for extensions will be considered in accordance with requirements specified in the Late Submissions and Extensions policy.
4.4.2	Assessments submitted after the published deadline will be considered in accordance with requirements specified in the Late Submissions and Extensions policy.
4.5	Resits and Retakes
	essment (resit) provides a student with the opportunity to take an assessment or ation again if they did not achieve an overall passing grade for the module.
	e provides a student with the opportunity to study a whole module again when all resit unities have been exhausted.
4.5.1	Students who do not achieve a passing grade in a module will be permitted a single resit attempt on the failed summative assessment(s).
	Students who have achieved an overall passing grade for a module will not be permitted to resit any failed individual summative assessment(s).
4.5.2	Resit attempts must be taken at the first opportunity, usually within the same academic year that the module was studied, unless valid extenuating circumstances were approved during the resit period.
4.5.3	Students who successfully pass a resit component will have their resit assessment mark capped at 40% for Levels 3-6, or 50% for Level 7.
4.5.4	Students who successfully pass a resit element will receive an uncapped resit assessment mark; however their overall module mark will be capped at 40% for Levels 3-6, or 50% for Level 7.
4.5.5	Students who have exhausted all available resit opportunities without achieving an overall pass grade will be deemed to have failed the module. Students who fail a module will be permitted to retake it, subject to the relevant progression and continuation regulations (Section 5 of these regulations).
4.5.6	The University cannot guarantee that all modules will be available to be taken again. Where a module is no longer available the student will be required to take an alternative replacement module.
4.5.7	Students who fail an option module may choose to study an alternative module from the options listed in the Course Guide rather than retake the module they have failed.

4.5.8	Students who successfully pass a retake module (including alternative/replacement retake modules), which are assessed using components, will have their maximum assessment marks limited to 40% for Levels 3-6, or 50% for Level 7.
4.5.9	Students who successfully pass a retake module (including alternative/replacement retake modules), which are assessed using elements, will have their maximum overall module mark limited to 40% for Levels 3-6, or 50% for Level 7.
4.5.10	Students are not permitted to resit assessments or retake modules in which they have achieved a passing grade, unless this has been agreed through the Academic Appeal or Extenuating Circumstances.
4.6	Compensation
•	nsation is the process through which, in limited circumstances, a student can be granted a pass dule for which they achieved a marginal fail grade (35-39%).
4.6.1	Compensation will only be applied where an overall module grade is between 35-39% and where all other compensation conditions are met.
4.6.2	Levels of compensation are specific to each type of award (see Appendix A). Compensation at levels 3, 4 and 5 will only be considered where a student has passed a minimum of 80 credits at that level.
	Compensation at level 6 will only be considered where a student has passed a minimum of 100 credits at level 6.
4.6.3	Compensation is not permitted for:
	Sandwich Placement modules
	 Work-based or work-related modules Independent Study modules (in courses where independent study is assigned to a specific module).
4.6.4	Compensation will be automatically applied as follows:
	 For Levels 3 and 4, compensation will be applied at the earliest opportunity.
	 For Levels 5 and 6, compensation will be applied after all submission opportunities in the current academic year have been exhausted.
4.6.5	Where a student receives a fail grade and the grade for a subsequent resit is lower, the highest grade will be used for the purposes of assessing eligibility for compensation.
4.6.6	There is no right to resit an assessment in a module for which a compensated pass has been awarded.
4.6.7	Where a module is compensated students will be awarded credit for the module, but the % mark will not be changed. This will be recorded as a Compensated Pass (CP) and may be included in the calculations for the classification of an award.

5 Progression and Continuation

Decisions regarding student progression or continuation will be made in accordance with the terms of the Code of Practice on Assessment Boards.

5.1 Progression

Progression regulations specify the conditions that need to be met for a student to progress to the next level of their course.

- 5.1.1 Full time students on courses with more than one level can progress to the next level, providing they have:
 - Passed at least 100 credits on the current level.
 - Not exceeded the maximum registration period for their award or any interim award.
 - Are in a position to recover any failure.
 - Passed all modules at level 3 before commencing level 5.
 - Passed all modules at level 4 before commencing level 6.

In addition, students on Integrated Masters courses can progress to level 7 where they have:

- Passed all modules at level 6 before commencing level 7, and
- Achieved a minimum of 2:2 (lower second class) degree classification on completion of level 6.
- 5.1.2 Part time students on courses with more than one level will be permitted to study modules at the next level, providing they have:
 - Passed at least 60 credits on the current level.
 - Not exceeded the maximum registration period for their award or any interim award.
 - Are in a position to recover any failure.
 - Passed all modules at level 3 before commencing level 5.
 - Passed all modules at level 4 before commencing level 6.

In addition, students on Integrated Masters courses can progress to level 7 where they have:

• Passed all modules at level 6 before commencing level 7, and

Achieved a minimum of 2:2 (lower second class) degree classification on completion of level 6.

5.2 Continuation

Continuation regulations specify the conditions that need to be met for a student to continue to study at the same level of their course

- 5.2.1 **Full-time** students who do not meet the criteria to progress to the next level can continue and/or repeat their studies at the same level on a **full-time** basis providing they:
 - Study more than 80 credits (100 credits for Accelerated Single Honours Degrees) with a maximum of 20 credits from the next level of study.
 - Study the outstanding modules for the level or approved alternatives for these.
 - Are in a position to recover any failure.
 - Have not exceeded the maximum registration for their award or any interim award.
- 5.2.2 **Full-time** students who do not meet the criteria to progress to the next level can continue or repeat their studies at the same level on a temporary **part-time** basis providing they:
 - Study no more than 80 credits with a maximum of 20 credits from the next level of study,
 - Study the outstanding modules for the level or approved alternatives for these.
 - Are in a position to recover any failure.
 - Have not exceeded the maximum registration for their award or any interim award.
- 5.2.3 **Part-time** students who do not meet the criteria in 5.2.1 can continue or repeat their studies at the same level providing they:
 - Study no more than 80 credits with a maximum of 20 credits from the next level of study,
 - Study the outstanding modules for the level or approved alternatives for these.
 - Are in a position to recover any failure.
 - Have not exceeded the maximum registration for their award or any interim award.
- 5.2.4 Full time students studying a Graduate Certificate or Graduate Diploma award who do not achieve the required credits for their award can continue and or repeat their studies providing they:
 - Study the outstanding modules for the level or approved alternatives for these.
 - Are in a position to recover any failure.

Have not exceeded the maximum registration for their award or any interim award.

- 5.2.5 Part time students studying a Graduate Certificate or Graduate Diploma award can continue and/or repeat their studies providing they:
 - Have no more than 20 credits outstanding from modules already studied.
 - Are in a position to recover any failure.
 - Have not exceeded the maximum registration for their award or any interim award.
- 5.2.6 Where a student is following a non-standard delivery pattern (such as those commencing their studies in semester 2), which does not allow sufficient time to process progression and continuation decisions before the start of the next academic year, a provisional decision will be made pending the final decision reached in accordance with the terms of the Code of Practice on Assessment Boards.

This provisional decision will take into consideration the students' current results and students must pass at least 40 credits for progression or continuation. This provisional decision will enable students to enrol pending the final decision. Students who are subsequently found not to have met the criteria for progression or continuation will be discontinued from that level or year of their course.

This decision will be taken within four weeks of the start date of that level or year of their course.

6	Awards
6.1.1	To be eligible for an award or any interim award validated for a course students must meet the credit requirements detailed in Appendix A.
6.1.2	Where credit has been achieved that is insufficient for an interim award, or where none exists, a University Statement of Credit will be awarded via the student transcript.
6.2	Classification of Awards
6.2.1	The classification of the following awards will be calculated using a count of the student's best credits taken at the University of Wolverhampton on their current course, as specified in Appendix B: • Foundation Degree • Higher National Certificate (HNC) • Higher National Diploma (HND)
6.2.2	The classification of the following awards will be calculated using a percentage grade average, based on the grades from the student's best credits taken at the University of Wolverhampton on their current course as specified in Appendix B: • Bachelors Degree with Honours • Integrated Masters Degree
6.2.2	Marginal fails at 35-39%, where a pass by compensation has been awarded, will be counted towards the percentage average if they form part of the grades from the student's best credits.
6.2.3	The criteria used in deciding on the classification of a student's award are detailed in Appendix B. For Bachelors Degree with Honours and Integrated Masters Degrees this includes the criteria for deciding on classifications where the percentage grade average falls within a border range of two classifications:
6.2.4	Grades gained in modules owned and delivered by another educational institution, will only be included in the calculation of a classification where this has been specifically approved at validation. Where this is not the case the classification will be based on the University of Wolverhampton modules only.

6.3 Interim Awards

An Interim Award is a qualification given where a student has completed part but not all of their full award.

- 6.3.1 Interim awards will only be awarded to students who have achieved sufficient credits to be eligible for an interim award <u>and</u>:
 - Chosen to exit the course without completing the full award,

or

• Failed to achieve the award for which they were registered within any of the relevant maximum registration periods,

or

• Been excluded by the University.

In such cases the student will be awarded the highest interim award available on their course, based on the credits achieved. See Appendix A.

6.4 Aegrotat Awards

An Aegrotat award is an unclassified award that is given in exceptional circumstances to a student who is unable to complete an award or interim award due to very exceptional circumstances.

6.4.1 An Aegrotat award can be recommended when an Award Board has incomplete evidence of the student's performance to be able to recommend the award (or interim award) but is satisfied that, but for illness or other valid causes, the student would have reached the standard required.

In these circumstances, the student (or a person duly authorised by the student to act on their behalf) must have signified, in writing, that they are willing to accept the award and that any possibility of reassessment has been waived.

Aegrotat awards do not carry any classification or distinction.

- 6.4.2 An aegrotat award may be made posthumously. The Award Board will normally recommend the target award for which the student was enrolled.
- 6.4.3 Aegrotat awards will not be made on programmes carrying professional body accreditation, with the exception of posthumous awards where appropriate.
- 6.4.4 Recommendations for Aegrotat awards must be approved by the Director of Registry Services prior to confirmation.

6.5 Revocation of Awards

- 6.5.1 In exceptional circumstances, following an investigation, the University may at any time, on the recommendation of Director of Registry Services revoke an award and all privileges connected therewith, having determined that there is good cause to do so. This can include but is not limited to the following grounds:
 - Where an award is found to have been obtained by fraud or deception, including academic misconduct.
 - Where a graduate has not met the requirements of the award conferred,
 - Where the award has been obtained due to administrative error or irregularities in the conduct of the Award Board.
